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Introduction

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About this Information Pack

This pack contains information that may be useful to parents and carers of children (aged 0 -19 years) with an autism spectrum disorder (ASD) living in the London Borough of Tower Hamlets.

The pack has been put together and is maintained by the Family Support Worker at NAS Tower Hamlets, Autism Support.

The pack is organised into 10 sections. As you will see from the index, each section is on a different colour background to make it easier to find the information you need. Where it seemed helpful, the section has an introduction page. All other entries contain information about services and organisations that may be helpful to you, your family or your child. The entry will explain what the service or organisation does and then gives any other relevant information such as when and where their services run, whether the organisation provides transport and how to access the services they provide. The contact details for the service or organisation can always be found in the box at the bottom of the page.

Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASDs)

Autism (or an 'autism spectrum disorder' or 'ASD' as it will be called for short in this information pack) is a lifelong developmental disability. It is estimated to affect 1 in 100 people in the UK but due to the 'invisible' nature of the condition, it is still often misunderstood.

ASD, as the name suggests, is a spectrum disorder. This means that, while everyone with an ASD will have common difficulties, it affects different individuals very differently. Some people with an ASD will also have learning difficulties and very limited speech whilst others may have fluent speech and average or above average intelligence (or 'IQ'). Given this, some people with an ASD will be able to live relatively 'everyday' lives; others will require a lifetime of specialist support.

ASD includes a range of diagnoses including autism, Kanner (or 'classic') autism, Pervasive Developmental Disorder (PDD) and Asperger syndrome.

All people with an ASD, no matter what their exact diagnosis, will have common difficulties in three main areas, sometimes called the 'triad of impairments':

1. Difficulty with social communication

People with ASD have difficulties with both verbal and non-verbal language. Many have a very literal understanding of language, and think people always mean exactly what they say.

It helps if other people speak in a clear, consistent an unambiguous way and give people with autism time to process what has been said to them.

2. Difficulty with social interaction

People with an ASD often have difficulty recognising or understanding other people's emotions and feelings, and expressing their own, which can make it more difficult for them to fit in socially. They may not understand the unwritten social rules which most of us pick up without thinking and prefer to spend time alone rather than seeking out the company of other people. They may also appear to behave 'strangely' or inappropriately, as it is not always easy for them to express feelings, emotions or needs.

3. Difficulty with social imagination

Social imagination allows us to understand and predict other people's behaviour, make sense of abstract ideas, and to imagine situations outside our immediate daily routine. Difficulties with social imagination mean that people with an ASD find it hard to understand and interpret other people's thoughts, feelings and actions and predict what will happen next, or what *could* happen next. It also means that they may not understand the concept of danger, for example that running on to a busy road poses a threat to them. Children with autism may enjoy some imaginative play but prefer to

act out the same scenes each time and many people with autism find it difficult to prepare for change and plan for the future or cope in new or unfamiliar situations.

Difficulties with social imagination should not be confused with a lack of imagination. Many people with autism are very creative and may be, for example, accomplished artists, musicians or writers.

With specialist education and structured support all people with an ASD can learn new skills and be supported in living rewarding lives and achieve their full potential.

Autism and Asperger syndrome are both autism spectrum disorders (ASDs). People with autism and Asperger syndrome therefore share the three common areas of difficulty listed above. However, people diagnosed with Asperger syndrome do not usually have the learning difficulties that are often displayed by people with autism.

People with Asperger syndrome are often very competent in their use of language and usually display average or above average intelligence. However, people with Asperger syndrome, like people with other ASDs, still find it difficult to understand non-verbal and non-literal verbal communication, have difficulty in building and maintaining social relationships and can often be unaware of other people's reactions and emotions.

In addition the NAS do a lot of work with the government to try and improve provision and services for those with an ASD and their families. They also seek to raise awareness of ASDs and help people understand them better through research and campaigns.

NAS Tower Hamlets Autism Support

NAS Tower Hamlets Autism Support is a project that is being run by the National Autistic Society in partnership with the London Borough of Tower Hamlets (Integrated Services for Disabled Children) and PCT. We provide information, advice and support to the parents and carers of children and young people with an autism spectrum disorder (ASD) living in the borough.

We can support any family with a child or children (aged between 0 and 19 years) with a diagnosis of ASD (including Asperger Syndrome), living in the London borough of Tower Hamlets. We aim to reach parents soon after diagnosis but support can be given at other times of need.

Some of the services we offer include:

- A home visit, as soon as requested after diagnosis, to meet families and discuss their needs and concerns
- Information and advice to help families learn more about ASDs and gain confidence in meeting their child's needs
- Information about local services appropriate to the needs of the family
- Support in accessing these services
- Ongoing telephone support if desired
- Seminars and workshops about ASDs that are tailored to the expressed needs of families
- A small lending library of books on ASDs and related topics

Languages Spoken: English. Interpreters are available on request. If you require an interpreter then when you telephone please provide your name and, in English, your telephone number, and the language required and we will call you back with an interpreter as soon as possible.

Local Children's Centres

There are currently 20 Children's Centres in Tower Hamlets. Each of these will provide the following core services:

- Early learning opportunities including nursery education integrated with day care.
- Baby and toddler activities and stay and play sessions.
- Links to services for children with additional needs and disabilities (e.g. occupational therapy, speech and language therapy etc.).
- Outreach services to families in the area.
- Family support including support for families of children with additional needs and provision and courses for fathers.
- Health services (e.g. antenatal care, advice on breast-feeding, weaning, diet, healthy eating etc.).
- A base and information point for community childcare services.
- Links with community nurseries, out of school clubs and extended schools.
- Links with local education, training and employment services and access to financial and employment advice.

Age Range: Families with children aged 0 - 5 years.

How to access this service: Families can contact their local children's centre directly and are always welcome to drop in to any children's centre to find out about the services on offer.

Tower Hamlets Opportunity Group (THOG)

THOG are a play group that run inclusive play sessions. Children are welcome with any disability and / or additional need, including those with an ASD / speech and language difficulties / behavioural difficulties. A high staff to child ratio is always maintained and there are many different play activities for children to choose from.

When and where: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday 9.30am – 12.30pm, Thursday 9am- 12noon at Around Poplar Children's Centre

Transport: THOG run a fully escorted transport service for children in the group with profound disabilities or additional needs or who are in need that covers all of Tower Hamlets. Places are allocated on a first come, first served basis.

Age Range: 2 – 5 years

How to access this service: referrals can be made by a Social Worker, Health Visitor or other children's professional. Parents can also self-refer by requesting a place in writing. There is often a waiting list for places at this play group.

Tower Hamlets Portage Service

Portage is a home teaching service for pre-school children with additional needs. Parents or carers are taught new skills, techniques and activities to practise with their child between home visits to help build on their child's abilities and aid their development.

Age Range: 0-5 years. Portage will only work with children who are not already in receipt of daily early years provision.

Toyhouse – Working with Families

Toyhouse Libraries Association Tower Hamlets provides support to families via inclusive play provision, toys and resources for young children and their carers to enjoy together. They run play sessions around Tower Hamlets and have a lending library of toys that children can borrow to extend the play at home. There is a mobile toy library service for referred children with special needs and their families.

Toyhouse runs projects offering stay & play sessions specifically for families living with children with disabilities and / or additional needs, as well as inclusive mainstream Stay & Play with Toy Library sessions – for those with any disability or with none - around the borough.

When and where:

Inclusive mainstream stay and play sessions, as well as those for children with additional needs and their siblings, run at various locations around the borough. Some run during the week and some run at weekends. Please contact Toyhouse Libraries for more information, or you can look on the Toyhouse website.

Please also contact them to find out where your nearest Toy Library sessions run.

Age range: Toyhouse run sessions for both under and over 5s.

Mondays – Baby group under 18 months

Wednesday mornings – 10am to 12pm – Drop in session

Transport: a free taxi service for those with mobility difficulties can be arranged for families referred to the special sessions.

Tower Hamlets Early Years Service Inclusion Team Early Intervention Support Worker

The Inclusion Team is part of Tower Hamlets Local Authority Early Years Service and is comprised of three Early Years Area Inclusion Coordinators (see next entry) and an Early Intervention Support Worker.

The Early Intervention Support Worker works with families of young children with disabilities and children with additional needs. Their work includes providing support to help families to access service such as stay and play groups, day nurseries and independent playgroups when children have not attended childcare provision.

The role of the Early Intervention Support Worker is to:

- contact and visit families in order to offer information, guidance and support about local services
- · accompany and welcome families to services
- support families to access play and learning activities by working in partnerships with other organisations and agencies
- support transitions for children from home to early years setting / nursery school, to ensure that transitions are successful for individual children and families.
- liaise with other agencies in order to support the coordination of support for families

Tower Hamlets Early Years Service Inclusion Team Early Years Area Inclusion Coordinators

The Inclusion Team is part of Tower Hamlets Local Authority Early Years Service and comprises of an Early Intervention Support Worker (see previous entry) and three Early Years Area Inclusion Coordinators.

The Early Years Area Inclusion Coordinators work with private, voluntary and independent early years settings, day nurseries and children's centres to develop their inclusive practice.

Each playgroup and day nursery will have a staff member who is the Inclusion Coordinator for that setting. They are responsible for working with parents to ensure the setting meets children's additional needs.

The Early Years Area Inclusion Coordinator's role includes:

- providing advice and guidance for staff and parents on supporting children with additional needs
- supporting the Inclusion Coordinator for the setting to work with parents to identify children's needs, plan approaches to help children and review progress
- support the Inclusion Coordinators to plan transitions from home to the setting and from the setting to school for children with additional needs
- liaise with other agencies in order to support the coordination of support for children with additional needs

If you plan for your child to attend, or he/she already attends, a **non-maintained early years setting** (one that is not funded by the Local Education Authority) and you would like support from the Inclusion Team then ask to speak to the Inclusion Coordinator **who works at the setting** and they can contact the Inclusion Team. For more information contact the Senior Early Years Area Inclusion Coordinator.

If your child attends a nursery school or a nursery class attached to a school - then you should ask to speak to the Inclusion Coordinator / SENCo in the school for help and support.

The Parents Advice Centre (PAC)

The Parent's Advice Centre (PAC) can give advice and support regarding the education of children with any special educational need (SEN). Normally parents / carers will be assigned a caseworker to help them with their particular issue or issues. Caseworkers can give you:

- Advice and information about SENs and the assessment process
- Help resolving any difficulties that arise relating to assessment or support your child receives
- Help in translating and understanding letters and written information
- Support with writing letters and filling in forms
- Support preparing for and going to school meetings (e.g. annual reviews).
- Information leaflets / videos / CDs about SENs
- Advice and support with appeals if your child is excluded form school

It is also possible to get an appointment to see an Educational Psychologist at the PAC to get advice about SEN.

When and where: Drop-in sessions run Tuesday and Friday 9:30am – 3pm at the centre. Sessions with and Educational Psychologist are by appointment only.

How to access this service: Parents / carers can go to a drop-in session on a Tuesday to see an advisor and will normally be assigned a caseworker. Otherwise parents or carers can contact PAC by telephone or email and book an appointment with an advisor or an Educational Psychologist.

- ensuring that the views of parents/carers are taken fully into account when their children's needs are assessed and decisions are made about their special education provision
- going to an special educational needs tribunal to appeal against a decision about special educational provision

IPSEA is a volunteer-based organisation and many of the volunteers providing telephone advice and Tribunal support are themselves parents of children with special educational needs who have been helped by IPSEA in the past.

The Phoenix School

Phoenix is a non-selective state special community school for girls and boys. The school is a specialist school for pupils with language and communication difficulties and severe learning difficulties. The majority of pupils have been diagnosed with ASD. All classes are special classes for SEN pupils.

Phoenix School also run several services and groups, conferences and seminars that are open to anyone in Tower Hamlets who has a child with an ASD, not only those whose children attend the school. The best point of contact is to call the school and arrange to go along to the Parents Autism Support Group (see the Support section) that is held once a month. Please state if you will need to use the crèche service when attending this group.

Age Range: 3 - 19 years. Day pupils only.

Phoenix Outreach Team

The Phoenix School (a special school for children with social and communication difficulties, including ASD) manage an outreach team that support the teaching and learning of children aged 3 – 16 with an ASD who are being educated in mainstream schools.

The team comprises specialist teachers and teaching assistants who will work directly with pupils and will also support teachers in finding appropriate strategies to meet these pupils' special educational needs successfully.

Children who have a statement of SEN will be seen at their school or early years setting by someone from the outreach team around four times per term.

Pupils who don't have a statement can still access support from this team. Schools who are educating such pupils should contact the team for advice and more information about training and support.

How to access this service: The Tower Hamlets SEN Section should refer all pupils with a diagnosis of ASD and a statement of SEN to this team. Parents of pupils who do not have a statement of SEN but who think their child might benefit from the support and involvement of this team at school should request that their child's school contact the outreach team directly.

Our team has extensive training and experience of working with children and young people with autism in a range of educational settings.

We provide:

- a bespoke service, with support tailored to meet the needs of each pupil. classroom or education setting
- advice on adapting the learning environment for pupils with autism
- support in raising attainment and increasing inclusion for pupils with autism and/or with social communication issues
- support to promote knowledge, understanding and skills for pupils with autism and/or with social communication issues
- opportunities for clients to observe teaching and learning in one of our own schools across the UK

This team is part of Tower Hamlets council and their role includes:

- Administration of the Statutory Assessment procedure for children with SEN
- Advice to parents, schools and other agencies on all matters relating to SEN
- Weekly Pre-Assessment and SEN panels

Introduction

As a family caring for a child with a disability you or your child may be entitled to various benefits, services and grants over and above those you might ordinarily receive.

The main benefits, grants and services relating to your status as the family of a child with a disability are:

- Disability Living Allowance
- Family Fund Grants
- Carer's allowance
- Services or direct payments from children's social services to help you meet your child's care needs (for more info see the Short Breaks and Respite section).

Benefits you might also be entitled to include:

- Child tax credit
- Child Benefit (everyone with a child is entitled to this)
- Working tax credit
- Income support
- Housing Benefit
- Council Tax Benefit

There are many different organisations that can help you working out which benefits to apply for and when and how to apply. Some of these will also help you to fill in and send off the relevant forms and some can also offer advice or support with housing issues. The main organisations that can offer this kind of help in Tower Hamlets are listed over the following pages.

Sometimes a social worker would also be able to help you with claiming any benefits you are entitled to.

National Autistic Society Welfare Rights Service

The NAS operates a welfare rights service providing telephone advice and support in all aspects of social security benefit entitlement. This includes advice on which benefits you may be entitled to, help in completing claim forms, what to do if you think a decision is wrong and how to appeal to a tribunal. You can telephone the autism helpline to arrange a telephone appointment with the welfare rights advisor or you can email with you enquiry. Alternatively you can fill in an enquiry form on the website.

When: the Autism helpline is open for telephone enquiries from 10.00 am - 4.00 pm Monday – Friday. Someone at the helpline will take some details and arrange a telephone appointment with the welfare rights advisor.

The Freedom Pass Scheme

Freedom passes exist to provide free public transport in London for people with disabilities that significantly affect their mobility. These passes can be used 24 hours a day, seven days a week for London Underground, London Buses and DLR. Eligible applicants must be regular users of public transport.

Applications: Application forms can be downloaded at the web address shown below or can be obtained by telephoning the Mobility Team. Completed applications should be returned to the Mobility Team by post.

Eligibility: To be eligible for a freedom pass you must be ordinarily resident in Tower Hamlets and over the age of two. You must also meet at least one of the following criteria:

- Receive the higher rate mobility component of disability living allowance
- You have a permanent and substantial disability which causes inability to walk or very considerable difficulty in walking
- Are registered blind
- Use a disabled person's car supplied by a government department, or receive a grant towards your own vehicle
- Receive a war pensioner's mobility supplement confirmed by a current award letter
- You drive motor vehicles regularly and have a severe disability in both upper limbs and a unable to turn by hand the steering wheel of a motor vehicle even if it is fitted with a turning knob

In some cases you will be subject to an assessment by the council to determine if you meet the eligibility condition.

The Taxicard Scheme

The taxicard scheme offers reduced fares in black cabs for people who have a disability that prevents them from using, or significantly limits their use of, public transport.

For each trip you take in a cab with your taxicard, you will have to pay the first £1.50. The council will then pay up to £10.30. If the trip costs more than £11.80 you will have to pay the extra.

In Tower Hamlets, there are 4 Taxicard bands:

- Band 1 gives up to 4 journeys a month
- Band 2 gives up to 8 journeys a month
- Band 3 gives up to 12 journeys a month
- Band 4 gives up to 16 journeys a month

The band you are awarded is determined under LBTH criteria. Any unused journeys can be carried forward for use in subsequent months.

Eligibility: To be eligible for a Taxicard you must be ordinarily resident in Tower Hamlets and meet at least on of the eligibility criteria.

You are automatically eligible for a Taxicard if you:

- receive the higher rate mobility component of disability living allowance
- are registered blind
- · receive a war pensioner's mobility supplement

All other applicants are assessed under LBTH discretionary criteria. All applicants will be assessed to determine which band they fall into.

Tower Hamlets Autism Spectrum Disorder Assessment Service (ASDAS)

The Autism Spectrum Disorder Assessment Service (ASDAS) is made up of various health and social care professionals including specialist paediatricians, speech and language therapists, occupational therapists and social workers. They are a part of Integrated Services for Disabled Children – a section of Tower Hamlets Council.

The team's role is to complete diagnostic assessments of children when it is thought that the child *may* have an autism spectrum disorder (ASD). They will also provide advice for the families of children they assess.

Dieticians

A dietician can give advice around diet and eating and can sometimes test for allergies and intolerances.

There are some specialist dieticians in Tower Hamlets who work with children with disabilities, including autism, although which dietician you are referred to (if any) will depend on the nature and severity of problems your child is encountering. Sometimes your GP will be the one to help with these issues.

Some parents of children with autism believe that sticking to a special diet can help with their child's behaviour and mood (you can get an information sheet on dietary interventions form the NAS Autism Helpline / NAS website or from your NAS family support worker). However, it is highly advisable to consult your GP or a dietician before starting any special diet or dietary intervention, especially if your child will only eat a limited number of foods to begin with.

How to access this service: referrals to a dietician will normally be made by your GP or consultant paediatrician if you are seeing one.

Occupational Therapy (OT)

Occupational Therapists offer help to those who struggle with various everyday activities. OT is often provided for people who have a disability that affects daily living activities such as toileting / toilet training, dressing, washing, feeding etc.

For children and young people with an ASD, OT can also sometimes be helpful for those who are experiencing sensory processing issues.

As well as giving suggestions about how to help your child improve at a certain task or how to meet your child's sensory needs, occupational therapists can also provide equipment or make adaptations to your home to improve safety / access.

There are some Occupational Therapists in Tower Hamlets who specialise in working with children and adults on the autism spectrum.

OT sessions can be run at home, in a clinic, in a school or nursery setting or local Children's Centre.

How to access this service: different professionals might refer you to an Occupational Therapist including the ASD Assessment Service (ASDAS), your GP, Health Visitor or child's school. You can also contact the Occupational Therapy Team directly and request an assessment (either by phone or a home visit) to determine whether you are eligible for some support from an Occupational Therapist.

Speech and Language Therapists work with people who have difficulty in communicating for one reason or another. Speech and language therapy is often provided for people who have a disability that affects their ability to communicate or their ability to eat and drink well.

Speech and Language Therapists are able to assess speech, language, communication and feeding abilities and can carry out therapy to assist with specific difficulties. They may also be involved in the implementation of alternative communication systems such as visual symbols or picture exchange systems or various kinds of sign language.

Speech and Language Therapists work for various teams in Tower Hamlets Primary Care Trust. Most children diagnosed with an ASD will be seen by the Social Communication Disorder Team.

Speech and language therapy sessions can be run at home, in a clinic, in a school or nursery setting or local Children's Centre (see the *Play and Leisure* section).

Tower Hamlets Speech and Language Therapy Service also sometimes run drop-in sessions and workshops for parents, giving advice about activities parents can do at home to support their child's language / communication development.

Age Range: 0 - 16 years.

How to access this service: different professionals might refer you to a Speech and Language Therapist including the ASD Assessment Service (ASDAS), your child's school, your GP or Health Visitor. In some cases speech and language therapy may be accessed through the Local Education Authority if it is recognised as an educational need on a child's statement of Special Educational Needs.

Tower Hamlets Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service (CAMHS)

CAMHS offer services to families where the child or young person is demonstrating behaviours or feelings that are concerning or very difficult for their families to manage.

Various multi-disciplinary teams within Tower Hamlets CAMHS teams can offer therapies to children / young people and their families to try to alleviate the emotional, behavioural or mental health difficulties the young person is facing. There is a multi-disciplinary team in Tower Hamlets is dedicated to helping those children / young people with a social communication disorder, such as ASD, and their families.

CAMHS teams also sometimes complete assessments and diagnoses, usually for children aged over 5.

How to access this service: Referrals to the CAMHS must be made through your local generic CAMHS team. There are two of these: the West team serving post codes E1 and E2 and the East team serving postcodes E3 and E14. Your GP, health visitor, social worker or other professional must refer families to this service.

National Autistic Society autism seminars for families

The National Autistic Society (NAS) run programmes and seminars for the parents and carers of children with an ASD, including Asperger Syndrome.

The NAS delivers seminars nationally and support families to:

- develop an understanding of autism
- · gain awareness of sensory needs of children with autism
- · discuss experiences of getting a diagnosis
- · identify how autism can affect families
- explore practical ideas for developing communication strategies
- clarify support that families may be entitled to and ways to access this
- discuss why children with autism often have challenges with anger
- identifies a low arousal approach for support through stressful situations
- explore the cycle of anger and possible support strategies
- examine strategies for managing feelings
- consider sensory systems and how effective these may be
- examine how sensory information may be processed differently
- discuss how people with autism may experience different senses.

National Autistic Society EarlyBird Programme

The EarlyBird course was devised by the National Autistic Society for parents of children with a diagnosis of autism aged 0-5 years. It aims to help parents to:

- Understand their child's autism
- Develop communication
- Manage inappropriate behaviours
- Take a positive approach
- Feel more confident and more in control

Courses run over one academic term with 6 sessions at the school spread over 6 weeks and three home visits from the EarlyBird trainers.

Currently the Phoenix School are running EarlyBird courses for Parents in Tower Hamlets. They also run a modified course for parents of slightly older children.

When and where: Sessions at the school are on Tuesday 10:30-12:00, every week for 12 weeks (term-time only). The 12 weeks comprise of 9 school visits and 3 home visitis.
